**Heads Up! Protecting Our Headwaters and Trout
Habitat**

Paula Piatt is a member of TU's national staff and is employed as the eastern sportsmen organizer. Part of her job involves visiting hunting and/or fishing clubs throughout the state with presentations pertaining to conservation of habitat and resources. She will present a program "Heads Up! Protecting Our Headwaters and Trout Habitat." It focuses on the importance of protecting our wild and native trout populations. She will discuss why headwater streams are important, as well as the current and potential impacts on the streams and the habitat surrounding them. Also discussed will be the state's current stream assessment and designation process and Pennsylvania's Un-assessed Waters Initiative. The presentation also includes information on current legislative issues that affect fish and wildlife habitat, and how your club can help with advocacy issues.

"Bugs!"

Rob Rohrbach, the former owner of the Little Lehigh fly shop, gave an informative and entertaining presentation on "bugs", the insects living in our trout streams. Good presentation illustrating the four basic types of aquatic insects (stoneflies, mayflies, caddis and Midges) and the habitat that each prefers. It was also good reminder that while fly fisherman often get obsessed with the elegant mayflies, the other types can be just as important for fishing success. Rob is publishing his own book this spring Thoughts, Observations and advice of a Trout Bum.

Gary Borger also showed a very, very short (and blurry) video on casting.

Proposed changes in Delayed Harvest Areas.

The Pa. fish commission is currently considering a fairly major change in the regulations in Delayed Harvest Areas. Current regulations are artificial lures only and no harvest until mid June. The new proposed plan for next year is that delayed harvest will end June 1st and after that any kind of bait can be used. In addition, youths under 16 years of age will be able to fish with bait in delay harvest areas all year round.

Given that there are few delayed harvest areas in Pa. and there is thousands of miles of open water, it is hard to understand the justification or need for this change. While it is certainly true that much "open water" gets fished out by bait fisherman who kill or harvest many fish, it is hard to understand why that requires delayed harvest areas to be open to bait. If you are concerned, please comment to the fish commission. Interested persons are encouraged to submit written comments, objections or suggestions about the proposed rulemaking to the PFBC Executive Director John Arway, Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission, P.O. Box 67000, Harrisburg, PA 17106-7000.

Water temperature and trout

Through personal experience, I have discovered that there are a lot of reasons not to catch any fish. The usual reasons given are the wrong fly, no hatches, bad time of day, and stream level too high or too low. Another reason is water temperature and oxygen level in the water. As temperature in streams rise there is less oxygen in the water. Fish move out of some water into areas that have higher oxygen content. You may be fishing where there are no fish.

Below is chart illustrating how fish move as the temperature and Oxygen level changes. In March and early April expect water temperatures to be in the high thirties and lower forties. Trout will sometimes feed quite actively at those temperatures if the insects are active.

Mid-October to Mid-November	32 to 45	13 to 15 ppm	Slower runs and seams as well as deep slow pools	Slowly fished streamers, strike indicator nymphing

From Pennsylvania Turnpike (I-276)

Take Exit 333 (Norristown - old exit 25). At the end of the ramp, turn left onto Plymouth Road. At the light, turn right onto Germantown Pike West. Continue approximately one (1) mile, through four (4) traffic lights (not counting the left hand turn light at Sandy Hill Road). At the fifth light, turn right onto Jolly Road. The Community Center is on the right at 2910 Jolly Road.

From Blue Route (I-476)

Take exit for Germantown Pike West (Exit 20). Continue on Germantown Pike west for approximately one (1) mile, through five (5) traffic lights (not counting the left hand turn light at Sandy Hill Road).
