November Speaker: Vic Attardo

Tough Trout!

Vic Attardo, a well known Pa. outdoors writer, will discuss the challenge of "tough trout".

Different fly fishermen measure success in different ways. For some it is measured by the number of fish caught, by others it is the desire to catch the largest trout. For a few fisherman, however, the great challenge is to catch that one particularly difficult fish that one seems to be able to fool. Nice goal but how do you accomplish it. Vic Attardo with talk about some proven strategies to fool the most difficult trout.

Last Month

Dwight Landis talked about "Mountain Trout: Wild Trout Fishing on Pa's Forested Freestone Streams" His talk was very informative about the variety and quality of these small mountain streams. There are many of them even in areas close the Philadelphia such as the Poconos. It is a different kind of fishing then most of us do, but could be a good challenge in the summer when the larger trout streams become too warm or too high. One idea that I took from his talk was that these streams fish best when the water is high and other streams are in poor shape due to flooding.

Winter trout fishing

Except for a BWO's may fly and caddis hatches are done for the season. Most stream temperatures will soon be dropping into the high thirties or low forties and trout fishing is limited. However there are two types of local streams that hold promise; limestone streams and tailwaters. Limestone streams such as the Little Lehigh and Valley Creek have springs that keep the water cool in the summer and relatively warm in the winter. Bottom release tailwaters, such as the Pohocopo and Tulpehocken, maintain an steady even flow during the winter and contain large numbers of midge larva. Both of these types of stream are promising bets on warmer winter days.

Carl Haensel wrote an excellent article in the December, Pa. Angler on winter trout fishing and made a number of recommendations for fly patterns that are effective. Here are some of his recommendations:

Pheasant tail Nymph size 16 -20 Zebra Midge size 22

Scud patterns in orange or gray size 12-18

Beadhead hares ear size 16-12 Prince Nymph size 16-12 Copper John size 16-12 Griffith Gnat size 18 and 20 Black Caddis size 16-18

When all else fails there are always Woolly Buggers.!

From Pennsylvania Turnpike (I-276)

Take Exit 333 (Norristown - old exit 25). At the end of the ramp, turn left onto Plymouth Road. At the light, turn right onto Germantown Pike West. Continue approximately one (1) mile, through four (4) traffic lights (not counting the left hand turn light at Sandy Hill Road). At the fifth light, turn right onto Jolly Road. The Community Center is on the right at 2910 Jolly Road.

From Blue Route (I-476)

Take exit for Germantown Pike West (Exit 20). Continue on Germantown Pike west for approximately one (1) mile, through five (5) traffic lights (not counting the left hand turn light at Sandy Hill Road). At the fifth light, turn right onto Jolly Road. The Community Center is on the right at 2910 Jolly Road.

From Route 202

Follow Route 202 to Germantown Pike. Travel EAST on Germantown Pike, through five (5) traffic lights. At the next traffic light, approximately half a mile, turn left onto Jolly Road. The Com- munity Center is on the right at 2910 Jolly Road.
